ISTP 2019: Copenhagen



Dear all,

As the Conference Chair for the upcoming ISTP Conference, in Copenhagen, I am happy to announce that we are now ready to receive registrations at: events.au.dk/ISTP2019. Early bird registration runs till May 24, final registration June 15. We have been overwhelmed with the vast number of highly qualified abstracts for symposia, papers, posters and panels, and we therefore anticipate a stimulating conference venue. Please visit the conference website (conferences.au.dk/istp2019) to get access to our suggested hotels, pre-booked for you, aiming at keeping our community together in Copenhagen. We encourage you to book hotels as soon as possible, since August is a busy month in Copenhagen, and our pre-bookings expire during the summer.

The five-day conference aims to strengthen dialogue and present intellectually challenging debates on matters pertinent to theoretical psychology and its role in contemporary society. The conference will begin Monday 19 August with a warm welcome at Danish School of Education, followed by the first keynote by Professor Hartmut Rosa on acceleration and its impact on everyday life and existence in modern Western societies. All keynotes address the theme of acceleration from various critical angles. As an appetizer we can reveal two keynote titles: Professor Uffe Juul Jensen will explore the topic of 'A good life and a healthy society: abstract utopia or concrete possibility in an age of escalating cultural-political acceleration?' Professor Dorte Marie Søndergaard, will present a keynote titled 'Psychology challenged? Refocusing our conceptual endeavours when culturenature and technology kick-in.' In addition to the keynotes, we are also launching and testing a new format with panel discussions, which will be held two in parallel. These provide a mid-sized forum for raising and exploring issues of importance—

historically, politically, and conceptually–from different perspectives. We hope that these panels will stimulate even more debate and dialogue in our community. For instance, the panel sessions will engage the theoretical legacy of Jan Smedslund, debate critical psychology in an unjust world by paying tribute to the contribution of Tod Sloan, explore Latin American voices on theoretical psychology, and much more. We have a break on Wednesday afternoon where delegates can explore the sights of Copenhagen for themselves or join the conference tour. This tour takes us north of Copenhagen to Helsingør (Elsinore) and Kronborg Castle–the famous home of Hamlet. Hopefully, we will have warm and sunny weather that will allow us to enjoy a visit to the beach en route to the Louisiana Museum of Modern Art, where we will enjoy a dinner and explore the exhibitions.

Thursday's conference dinner takes place in one of Copenhagen's most colorful neighborhoods, Nørrebro, at a location close to the lakes, where there will be every opportunity to experience how the city comes to life during summer evenings.

We hope to promote interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary approaches to psychological questions, to challenge persistent assumptions, and to critically explore psychology's role in local, national and transnational practices in a forum encouraging new perspectives. As always, the conference is an opportunity to both reaffirm and renew our community, and we welcome "old-timers" and "newcomers" alike in a continuation of our shared past and coming future history. The International Society for Theoretical Psychology (ISTP) will award up to 6 stipends in the amount of \$500 (CAD) to doctoral students for travel to the conference. The application deadline is May 17. Also, student members of ISTP with papers accepted for presentation at the conference are invited to submit their papers for consideration for the Sigmund Koch Award. ISTP Graduate Student Travel Award

The International Society for Theoretical Psychology (ISTP) will award up to 6 stipends in the amount of \$500 (CAD) to doctoral students for travel to the ISTP conference in Copenhagenm August 19-23, 2019.

Eligibility Requirements:

- Applicants must be Postgraduate students in Psychology or a field with a significant emphasis on Psychology at the time of the convention. Work that was completed while an individual was a graduate student but would be presented post-graduation is not eligible.
- 2. Applicants must be paid ISTP members. If an individual is not already a member, he or she may join by submitting an application for membership and payment along with the travel award application.
- 3. Applicants must have a paper accepted by the 2019 ISTP program committee.
- 4. Applicants must be the first author of the accepted conference paper.

Travel awards will cover conference-related expenses up to a maximum of \$500, including transportation, lodging, food, and conference registration. Award payments will be made only in the form of post-conference reimbursement for documented expenses. Receipts must be submitted to the Treasurer of ISTP for reimbursement (James Cresswell, jamesdcresswell@gmail.com).

Application Procedure and Deadline:

To be considered for a travel award, submit the following:

- 1. A completed application.
- 2. An academic curriculum vitae or résumé.
- 3. A one-page statement describing your research interests, career goals, and rationale for applying (e.g., how you would benefit from the award).
- 4. A copy of your abstract.

Please submit the application materials to Maria Gurevich (mgurevic@psych.ryerson.ca), Chair of the Student Travel Awards Committee, **by May 23, 2019**.

Decision Process and Notification:

Award decisions will be based on the excellence of the submitted conference abstract and on the strength of the applicant's scholarly record as judged by the 2019 Student Travel Awards Committee. ISTP will notify applicants of the award decisions by **June 1, 2019**. Award winners must **accept or decline their award within 48 hours of notification**. Award winners are required to submit (via email) a short biographical sketch no later than one week after the notification of the award. The award letter will contain complete details on how to document conference expenses.

Call for Submissions for the 2019 Sigmund Koch Award

Student members of ISTP with papers accepted for presentation at the 2019 ISTP conference in Copenhagen are invited to submit their papers for consideration for the Sigmund Koch Award. Applicants must be graduate students at the time of the convention (August 2019). Work that was completed while the student was a graduate student but would be presented post-graduation is not eligible.

The prize for the best student paper is based on the written conference paper AND the conference presentation.

The written papers should be submitted to Lorrie Radke, Chair of the Sigmund Koch Award Committee, at radtke@ucalgary.ca by July 20, 2019.

Please note that in order to be considered for this award, applicants must be student members of ISTP when they submit their written papers.

Call for Proposals to Host the 2021 ISTP Conference

The ISTP Executive Committee invites proposals to host the 2021 ISTP conference. Conference hosting entails responsibility for local arrangements and the conference program, with the support of the ISTP Executive. The Society encourages proposals from all parts of the world where members reside.

Statements of interest are due April 30, 2019 and complete proposals are due July 26, 2019. Statements of interest should outline the facilities available, projected costs, and plans to seek external funding for keynote speakers and other conference activities. Complete proposals will provide detailed information on these matters.

Statements of interest will be discussed by the Executive Committee at their meeting in May 2019 and feedback will be provided to the proponents. Complete proposals will be discussed by the Executive Committee at their meeting during the 2019 conference and presented to the membership at the Business Meeting. Proponents are invited to make the presentation to the general membership. The Executive will consider the preferences of the members attending the Business Meeting in finalizing the decision.


Meeting of the Society for Theoretical and Philosophical Psychology (Division 24 of the American Psychological Association) APA Convention in Chicago, August 8-11, 2019

From the Program Chairs:

During this year's APA Convention in Chicago, Division 24 will be confronting the question, 'What is social justice?' Our keynote session will feature Garth Stevens of the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, who will speak on the economies of affect, embodiment, and morality in the violence of contemporary migration; his presentation will be followed up by presentations on migration and social justice by Sunil Bhatia and Barbara Held. Additional programming will include collaborations with a number of other divisions, including the Society of Counseling Psychology and the Society for the Psychological Study of Culture, Ethnicity, and Race. And this year, our hospitality suite will feature a more robust program.

In addition to several symposia scheduled for the suite, Division 24's Critical Theories and Social Practices special interest group will collaborate with Division 27's Critical Community Psychology special interest group to bring senior scholars together with junior scholars and graduate students from both divisions for a lunch discussion and social. We will also host a special panel from Chicago-based HEART Women and Girls, an organization that promotes sexual health and sexual violence awareness in local Muslim communities. Upcoming Publication



Written by educational researchers and professionals working with children and adolescents in and out of school, this book shows how self-regulation involves more than an isolated individual's ability to control their thoughts and feelings, particularly in a learning environment. By using Vygotsky's cultural-historical psychological theory, the authors provide a unique set of four analytical lenses for a better understanding of how self-regulation, coregulation, and other-regulation function as a system of regulatory processes. These lenses move beyond a focus on solitary individuals, who self-regulate behaviour, to centre on individuals as relational, agential, and contextually situated. As agents, teachers and their students build their learning contexts and are influenced by these self-engineered contexts. This is a dynamic perspective of a social context and underlies the view that regulatory processes are an integral part of a functional system for learning.

- Supplies four unique sociocultural analytic frames for understanding and observing behavior regulation in learning contexts
- Shows how self-regulation involves more than an isolated individual's ability to control and direct behavior, thoughts, and feelings.
- Incorporates real-life examples of children and their teachers or mentors
